Dear friends, I love interesting facts. Debby tells me I have more useless information

in my head than anyone ever should! For instance, did you know that the traditional garb for judges and for Presbyterian preachers is virtually the same. Both historically have worn the academic gown as a sign of their education and both traditionally have worn tabs with their robes. Now, here is where it gets interesting. Do you know why they are called tabs? Quite simply because the two simple white pieces of cloth represented the two tablets which Moses carried off the mountain containing the ten commandments given by God to the people of Israel. Both the Preacher and the Judge wore them as reminders to measure their words by the 10 commandments! It is a wonderful irony that judges who have ruled against the public display of the Ten Commandments were wearing the symbols of those two stone tablets as they rendered their ruling!

Ironically, as well, is the word Easter, which of course denotes the Day of Resurrection that we celebrate after the forty days of Lent. Its origin takes us back to the Norse goddess of Spring, Eostre! As in many cases the name of the god/goddess and their function became interchangeable. So, the term Easter became the name for Spring. I think it is wonderful that schools and others who are trying to secularize their terminology no longer call it Easter break but now call it Spring break! They traded one word for another with the same meaning.

You see it wasn't unusual for the early church to use what people already knew to help them learn their new faith. What they did was take a familiar celebration such as for the arrival of Spring weather with all of its re-birth to help the new Christian Church to celebrate our rebirth in the resurrection of Jesus Christ! In essence they sanctified a pagan holiday to teach the Truth of the Gospel!

Call it whatever you will but I am glad that we fill the Church every Spring to re-hear and celebrate the Good News that God's Love is more powerful and more enduring than death!

I'll look forward to seeing all of you in Church!!!!



- We talked about the improvements, • acoustically, to the Family Center to make it easier for folks to hear no matter what the occasion may be.
- Heard that the Adult Summer Bible School • will be a two night look at the book of Romans with a particular interest in seeing its impact on the Reformation in this 500th anniversary of Luther's 95 Theses.
- Reminded ourselves that we will be hosting • with Camp Hanover the June 20th meeting of the Presbytery of the James.
- Celebrated the successful completion of the first year of the new Compass Sports program. Everyone involved thought it was excellent. Our gratitude goes to Danny Guertler and the many, many volunteers who made it happen.
- Learned of the plans for the Caritas week beginning April 1st. We will be welcoming the men this year and many people are working hard for us to be good hosts!
- · We were reminded that these Mission projects would not be possible without the support of those who generously contribute to the Mission Fund Drive which is underway right now.
- One of those projects is MCEF as they ٠ continue in their plans to centralize their

work in one location to be more efficient and more effective.

- · We learned that planning is underway to revamp the Children's Sunday School program to revitalize it as well as grow it.
- The Session approved the inclusion of tulips (hypo-allergenic) to the Easter worship Families will be given the service. opportunity to donate them in honor or memory of their loved ones similar to the use of poinsettias at Christmas.

Mission Team News

THE 2017 MISSION DRIVE is currently underway and will be going on through **April 23rd**. Our goal is to raise \$10,000 this year. Please pray about how you can help our church fund the many different missions that we do year round. Here is a list of all the organizations we helped in 2016 from your generous contributions:

Internationally-

David and Susan Howard – The Howard's work is to translate the Bible into the native language spoken in Papua, New Guinea, serving as missionaries for Wycliffe Bible Translators. The group, as of 2015, has translated the Bible into 550 languages and 2,883 languages have at least some portion of the Bible translated for use. 1800 languages are still awaiting translations.

The Jesus Film Project – A two-hour docudrama about the life of Christ, according to the Gospel of Luke. This film has been seen in every country of the world and translated into over thirteen hundred languages. Since the "JESUS" film was first shown 35 years ago, more than 200 million people have come to know Christ through the ministry of The JESUS Film Project®. This equates to one person every 5.5 seconds. Campus Crusade for Christ oversees this film project.

Mailing used Sunday School Books, Devotionals and Bibles to "**The Helping Hands Project**" located in Crimora Va. – they then repackage and mail out to missionaries to help them spread the gospel in many parts of the world.

Presbyterian Frontier Missions – Support of Richard Haney, Executive Director. PFF describes itself as "a mission support group that works with congregations to establish indigenous churches among unreached people." PFF reaches out to believing communities to engage people groups where the good news of Jesus and his kingdom is not yet known.

Mission of Hope Haiti – As an organization following Jesus Christ and spreading the word of God, by supporting and also building and rebuilding housing, orphanages, medical facilities, churches and schools.

Within the US

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance – Provides rapid response, during natural disasters, throughout the United States. Through Presbytery, these dollars are allocated on an as need basis when disasters strike and are available for immediate delivery, sharing with communities the healing love of Christ through caring for them during these catastrophic events.

Locally

Camp Hanover – We support both camperships, maintenance and also a garden project for our local outdoor youth and adult camp here in Hanover County. Camp Hanover is a Christ centered community, where youth find their direction and acceptance through God's presence.

Covenant Woods - Assistance is provided for the ongoing cost for senior adults who are no longer able to afford their own care.

Hanover Habitat for Humanity – A Christian housing ministry designed to assist the building of homes for low-income families. Homeowners provide sweat equity in their homes, make mortgage payments and learn about financial planning and responsibility.

Youth Life Foundation of Richmond – This organization works with children from at-risk communities in north side Richmond and eastern Henrico through after-school programs that cultivate academic success, character development, computer training, and health and wellness.

Relationship Foundation of Virginia – Formerly First Things First – Strives to strengthen relationships for better families by reversing the trend of deteriorating family relationships in the Greater Richmond area. They advocate, educate, motivate, and celebrate healthy marriages, engaged fathers and smart relationships among youth.

CARITAS (Congregations Around Richmond To Assure Shelter) – Our congregation will house and provide meals for one week for 32 homeless men in the Richmond area.

Stop Hunger Now – With our help in packing meals, they are able to distribute these meals and other aid to people around the world who suffer from hunger and starvation.

JESUS IS **RISEN!**


When Jesus' disciples saw that the stone was rolled away from his tomb, they knew he had risen. Make a moveable tomb to celebrate Easter.

What you need:

- 4 pieces of paper (brown, blue, black, yellow)
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Glue stick
- Brad fastener
- Marker

What you do:

- Fold the brown paper in half, short side to short side. Cut along the fold. On one half, draw and cut out a large half-circle (the tomb). On the other, draw and cut out a palmsized circle (the stone).
- 2. Glue the brown tomb onto the blue paper.
- 3. Cut a black circle (the inside of the tomb) the same size as the brown stone and glue it onto the brown tomb.
- 4. Place the brown stone over the black half-circle; this is the entrance. Push the brad through one edge so the stone can move from side to side.
- 5. Cut out a cross from the yellow paper and glue it by the tomb.
- 6. Write "Jesus is risen!" atop the blue paper.

There is no real way to put my feelings into words that will truly illustrate how humbled and thankful I am. The love and support you provided for Henri, the Moore Family, and our department is immeasurable. I know that you spent countless hours praying for the family and our brothers and sisters. Your contribution of spiritual guidance to our members, daily, is truly inspiring.

I hope you afford me the opportunity to express my appreciation to your congregation for lending your services as our volunteer Chaplain. Henri G. Moore, Jr. was not only a community servant for over 30 years, but for the past 17, he was my closest confidant, sounding board, and friend. At the time of his death, he was my Assistant Chief, responsible for Community Risk Reduction.

The learning of Henri's illness was sudden and very shocking for all of us. When we needed you the most; you were there. Your time in the hospital with me supporting the family, leading us in prayer, and providing emotional comfort was essential.

I am most grateful for the honor you provided Henri during the visitation and funeral services. One of my fears was that my brother firefighter and friend was going to be left alone. Even in death, it is in our culture to "stand guard", rendering Line of Duty honors for the body until internment. I feel blessed that you not only reassured the family during their final visit, but you accompanied his body during his final ride on the caisson. Finally, your beautiful words of comfort and final prayer for Henri helped us all find a small sense of peace during this tragic circumstance.

Your comfort and spiritual leadership will never be forgotten by the Moore Family, or the members of Hanover Fire-EMS.
