

In the church, March is a full month of the Lenten season. Lent can mean a lot of things to a lot of people, but one thing the Lent and Easter season Pastor's Message means in worship is that we get healthy doses of the Gospel of John to

shape our preaching, praise and prayers. This year three of the four Sundays in March have readings from John's gospel and the last Sunday is Palm/Passion Sunday. I would like to draw our attention to these John texts because I think they offer us a way to deepen our walk with God this month and this Lenten season.


The first reading in March is John 2:13-22. You may recall that John is unique in that he has Jesus cleansing the temple on his first of three trips to Jerusalem. John is more interested in Christology than chronology. That is to say that John focuses on who Christ is without much regard for the orderly development of the other gospels. This text reminds us that one of our tasks during Lent is to refocus our hearts, minds and life on the life God desires for us. Are we too caught up in the market place? Where is our zeal for the place where the presence of God resides? What do we need to drive out of our lives to more fully follow Jesus?

The second reading in March comes from the encounter with Nicodemus, John 3:14-21. Coming midway between Ash Wednesday and Easter this text is a reminder that however we have fallen short in our pursuit of God and God's will in our lives, grace is more than abundant to

save us and bring us more fully into the light of God's love. The light has come into the world, God sent the Son that the world might be saved through him. We can take time to ask for more of the light of God to shine in our lives and lead us into deeds that are done in God.

The third reading in March takes us back to Jerusalem in John 12:20-33. In these verses, Jesus speaks of his impeding death and what it will mean for the world. In the first section, Greeks come to Jesus and he speaks of how a grain of wheat must fall into the earth and die or it will remain but a single grain. Jesus in this text asks us to consider the cost to bear good fruit. By this time in the Lenten season we might have noticed attitudes or actions that we need to adjust in order to be better Christ followers. Pruning them out of our life can be difficult, but Jesus challenges us to let our lives go in order to be children of light.

The final week of March brings us to Palm Sunday and we will be looking expectantly toward Easter. I pray that this month will bring us closer to the light of Christ and the love of God.

News from Mechanicsville Churches Emergency Functions (MCEF) and One Stop Shop (OSS)

Here are some statistics for 2020:

- Direct Financial Assistance of \$50,011 to 107 families for electricity, water, rent, fuel oil and prescriptions.
- The OSS (which was closed for three months of 2020) served 350 households (1,026 people) with 2,215 bags of food, 636 bags of clothing and 79 bags of linens.
- Hanover Senior Rides gave 1,228 rides to 93 riders.

Making sue that our volunteers and clients were safe and felt safe at the OSS and with Senior Rides called for some creative strategies. Relying on the CDC and the VA Health department's guidance, we adapted and continue to adapt every week.

All the services provided in 2020 and everyday are because churches, businesses and individuals in Mechanicsville provide the funds and goods. It couldn't be done without you.

A few current needs that have been identified:

- bar soap, spinach, instant oatmeal and grits packets, pancake mix and syrup, jelly or preserves.
- · men's jeans smaller to medium sizes.
- · double and king sheet sets.



Laud & Honor on Palm Sunday

The Palm Sunday anthem "All Glory Laud and Honor" is one of Christendom's oldest hymns. St. Theodulf of Orleans who helped reform the church under Charlemagne, wrote the lyrics in the year 820 while imprisoned in France.

The Lyrics recount Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, and event the medieval church reenacted every Palm Sunday. Clergy and townspeople processed from fields through the city gates, behind a Jesus figure riding a donkey. At the gates, children began singing the hymn in Latin - *Gloria, laus et honor* - and onlookers soon chimed in.

City gates may be a thing of the past, as the website Hymnary.org notes, yet we still praise our blessed Redeemer "because we know just what kind of King he was and is - an everlasting King who reigns not just in Jerusalem but over the entire earth. What more could we do but praise him with glory, laud and honor."

All glory, laud, and honor to you, Redeemer, King,

to whom the lips of children made sweet hosanna ring.

You are the King of Israel and David's royal Son, now in the Lord's name coming, the King and Blessed One.




Notes from the Session

Your Elders met for their monthly meeting on February 16th during which time they:

- were glad to hear that the Youth Mission Trip is scheduled for 27 June 2 July returning to Altoona,
 PA. The initial reservations have been placed!
- received the report of the good work the Deacons are doing, most recently with a mailing to a number of our members who aren't able to worship with us.
- approved the Children's Ministry Team's plan to add a planter box or two to the playground to be used for lessons with the children and to grow some food for the MCEF Pantry.
- revived our activity of looking toward the future of the church in several areas which were put on the back burner because of the Covid-19 pandemic. We will be looking at growing our endowment, the possibility of a memorial garden/columbarium and solar panels.
- were reminded that the Lenten Bible Study will be done virtually as a part of the Wednesday evening prayer meeting on Zoom using a devotional called "Living into Lent" by Donald McKim.
- talked at length about how we gear up again following the pandemic including some type of celebration.
- endorsed the continued use of live streaming and posting our worship services on YouTube.
- supported the efforts of Facilities Management to continue to do many projects around the church including but not limited to fixing gutters, reupholstering furniture in the Barlow Parlor, and painting a hallway.
- were glad to learn that the Chair and Vice Chair of Personnel/Nominations had an orientation meeting to begin to look at what lies before them.
- affirmed Stuart Settle and J. R. Marker to be our Commissioners to the February meeting of the Presbytery of the James which will still be a virtual meeting via Zoom.
- learned plans are being made for the Lenten season to be kicked off by a simple Ash Wednesday service.
- · adjourned to meet again on March 16th.

MISSION FUNDS DISBURSEMENTS FOR 2020

With the generous contributions we received last year from the members of Fairfield Presbyterian Church, we were able to raise a total of \$14,016. It enabled us support to many organizations, internationally, within the US, and locally, which spread the word of Christ in their daily efforts, needed dollars for their ongoing projects. Each year we ask the same question when considering an organization or cause to support: *How do they spread the love of Jesus Christ in their endeavors?*

We are pleased to share with you how this money was spent and a little about the groups that were supported.

Internationally

David and Susan Howard – The Howard's arrived in Papua, New Guinea in 1998 and have been working among the Adzera people since 1999. David serves as a translation advisor for the Wycliffe Bible Translators and mentor to Adzera speakers translating the Scriptures into their mother tongue and as the team leader for the new Markham Multi-Language Project. He is also a translation consultant, has been involved in training Papua New Guinea Bible translators, and has served in administrative roles to meet short-term needs. Susan works on Adzera literacy projects when home responsibilities allow. She also teaches a literacy class in Ukarumpa and volunteers to meet various other needs in the community.

The Jesus Film Project – A two-hour docudrama about the life of Christ, according to the Gospel of Luke. This film has been seen in every country of the world and translated into over 1500 languages. Since the "JESUS" film was first shown in 1979, more than 490 million people have come to know Christ through the ministry of The JESUS Film Project®. This equates to one person every 5.5 seconds. Campus Crusade for Christ oversees this film project.

The Helping Hands Project - Our used Sunday School Books, Devotionals and Paperback Bibles were mailed out to missionaries in many parts of the world.

Frontier Fellowship – We help to support Richard Haney, the Executive Director. PFF describes itself as "a mission support group that works with congregations to establish indigenous churches among unreached people." PFF reaches out to believing communities to engage people groups where the good news of Jesus and his kingdom is not yet known.

Locally


Covenant Woods – we provided assistance for the ongoing cost for senior adults who are no longer able to afford their own care.

MCEF - One Stop Shop (OSS) - along with other Mechanicsville churches Fairfield is supporting the operating expenses of the OSS. Now that the ministries of MCEF are under one roof (7235 Stonewall Parkway, 23111), area churches have committed to helping with the operating expenses. Mechanicsville Churches Emergency Functions (MCEF) provides food, clothing, financial assistance and transportation through Senior Rides to our neighbors in the 23111 and 23116 zip codes.

Camp Hanover – We supported both camperships and maintenance for our local outdoor youth and adult camp, which is a Christ centered community, where youth and adults find their direction and acceptance through God's presence.

Angel Tree Project – Fairfield partnered with Cold Harbor Elementary School to help local families in need. You supplied a list of needs and a few wishes for a family of four children. Because of your

generosity, ten additional families received gift cards to Walmart to make Christmas special. Your gifts brought joy to many children and their families on Christmas morning.
