Here is a story that will
ready us for Holy Week.

The tiny infant wiggled out of the swaddling blanket once again. He seemed to have become an expert at this in no time at all. Mary would wrap him up again and set him down into the makeshift crib. But with a few back-and-forth wiggles, he'd be stretching out his arms as if showing his earthly parents just what he could do. His tiny out-stretched arms would wave until he was picked up and hugged close to his mother's heart. A silly thought came to mind, and she prompted Joseph to watch. She wrapped him in the swaddling blanket and as he wiggled free, she said, "How much do you love me?" The baby wiggled out with his tiny arms stretched wide, indicating 'this much.'

That little trick turned into a nightly ritual, as the boy became a toddler, now in his Nazareth home. His mom would tuck him in, and he'd wiggle out his arms and hold them wide for one last hug before closing his eyes. The cute dialogue was added to the nighttime routine once the toddler learned to talk. Mary would ask, "How much do you love me?" And he'd wiggle out his arms from under the blanket, hold them wide and say, "This much..." A hug would follow, filled with warm emotions of love.

As time went by, the boy grew into a teen and then into a young man, but their little ritual continued. "How much do you love me?" "This much," he'd say, and stretch out his arms as wide as he could. When going to the new, Roman city of Sepphoris to work construction with his father, Mary would call out from the door

of their small, mud-brick home, "How much do you love me?", and although he was only going 4 miles away, the young man would answer as if going on a long journey... "This much..." and hold out his arms as wide as he could.

But there came a time when it seemed she'd never hear those familiar words again. Her son, now grown and off on his own, had other things on his mind. He was preaching and teaching, he was known as a healer and worker of miracles, with crowds pressing in on him wherever he went. He was immersed in his new calling and seemed to have little time anymore for family. When someone cried out that his mother was nearby, she heard him respond that his mother was any woman who did the work of God. It was as if those loving arms pushed her away; brushed off to the side. Her heart broke, tears filled her eyes, the joy of those early days buried under her sadness and hurt. She kept her distance, but never lost hope.

A day came a few years later, when the young man was betrayed, arrested, and condemned to death. A mother should never hear such things about a son... should never witness such things for the one she loved. Horrors beyond belief - injustice on overload, she found herself standing at the foot of a Roman cross looking up at her dying first born son.

Through weeping gasps and stuttered attempts, she mouthed the old words she first spoke in the stable. "How much do you love me?" And there, with arms nailed to wood, strained as far as they could stretch...he whispered, using every ounce of strength he could muster, "This much..." And with arms stretched wide...he died.

I asked Jesus,
"How much do you love me?"
And Jesus said,
"This much..."
And he stretched out his arms and died.

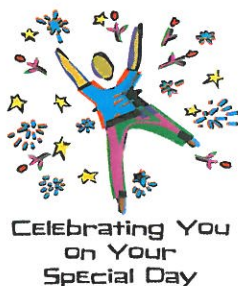

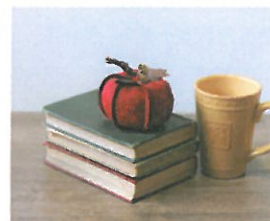

Medical Supplies for Loan

The Deacons have some medical supplies that we can loan out if you need an item on a short term basis while you are healing. We are unable to keep a large supply of items due to space constraints. The supplies we have are based on what our congregation has loaned or donated. Currently we have 1 set of wooden crutches, a wheelchair with no footrests, an electric wheelchair, 2 canes, 1 bedside commode, 1 non-electric scooter, 1 bedrail, 2 shower grips, 1 new shower chair unassembled in a box, a raised toilet seat, and a bathtub hand support. All items have been sanitized. We can only accept new or gently used items without tears or cracks due to sanitary reasons.

If you wish to donate an item, please check with Cindy Cattoi (804-221-0764 or Angela Schwartz (804-337-4475) first because we have limited space to house medical equipment. You can borrow a medical item by contacting Cindy or Angela and they will check to see if the equipment is available and get back in touch with you.

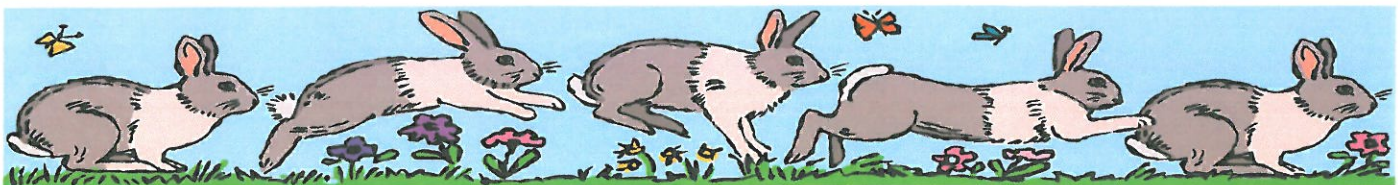

- Named David Cunningham as church representative for the Boy Scouts
- Voted to receive two new members
- Learned of the number of projects the Facilities Management Team has done and are planning
- Approved the Family Leave of 12 weeks per the recommendation of the Presbytery
- Rejoiced that the APNC is progressing well and are working wonderfully well together
- Thanked the Adult Discipleship Team for their provision for excellent materials and study for the Season of Lent
- Expressed their gratitude to Keith Curran, our Minister in Residence for his good work on the New TULIP study
- Rejoiced that the Children's Nurture Team will be providing an Easter Egg Hunt with lunch on April 16th
- Were delighted to hear of the plans to have the children participate in the Palm Sunday worship service
- Commended the Team for their work to rekindle in the Children's Clothing Swap following the break due to COVID
- Learned that the children's Sunday School program will re-start in earnest in the fall under the theme of "Kid's Club"
- Anticipated the return of Professor Jones to talk to the leadership and congregation concerning food insecurity and what we might do to alleviate it
- Heard from the Task Force on solar panels that a conversation is beginning with a congregation in Eastern VA Presbytery which has successfully integrated solar panels into their facility and mission
- Approved the Task Force on Columbarium/Memorial Garden to proceed with the design stage for the possibility of having a columbarium on the grounds of Fairfield Church

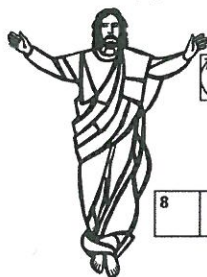
