The Stewardship and Finance Committee would like to express our heartfelt thanks to the members and friends of Fairfield! 2024 was an unusual year for the church financially. We began with our first

budget in many years that did not include a mortgage payment. As the year progressed, we began to run into several issues with our church building needing repairs and maintenance. These are not unusual for a building the age of ours, but it did feel like many issues piling on all at once. All in all, 2024 was probably the most expensive year for facility repairs and improvements since the construction of the Family Center addition.

Our Treasurer, Gene Rosen, has presented us with our Income Statement for 2024 and it shows that we ended the year with a Net Loss of less than \$9,000. This is with facilities expenses being nearly \$70,000 higher than we had budgeted. We are extremely grateful to the members of Fairfield for giving extra to help offset these unusual expenses. We also want to thank our brothers and sisters in the New Beginnings congregation for contributing towards the repairs as well.

With the mortgages on the church paid off, we are striving to rebuild the church's financial

reserves to be able to address these costly repairs as they are needed. The church was able to use the amount destined for reserves in 2024 to cover the \$9,000 loss and still increase reserves by more than \$25,000.

God is great and He is doing great things here at Fairfield. These facility repairs are needed because the facility is being used for God's glory, both in worship and in mission, as we seek to be faithful followers of Jesus Christ. We thank the Holy Spirit for touching the hearts of so many and pray that He will continue to bless our church building so that it may be a blessing to all who enter it.



#### **YOUTH SUNDAY - MARCH 16**

Save the date for our annual worship service led by members of our middle and high school youth groups. They will be working hard to bring thoughtful prayers, creative interpretation of Scripture, energizing music, in a day full of the Holy Spirit.



The Open Door Sunday School Class meets in the classroom next to the middle doors of the educational building adjacent to the Heritage Hall. We have four leaders that rotate weekly with a variety of topics and styles including session on church history, Christian living, and theology, as well as traditional Bible studies and discussions of current events. The classes are leader-guided discussions where class participation is not required, but encouraged. We all benefit from the input from our seasoned

R.'s, and Rob's lessons are focused on reviewing the Book of Acts from a Life Guide Bible Study by Phyllis J LePeau.

# NEWS FROM Mechanicsville Churches Emergency Functions (MCEF) and the One Stop Shop (OSS)

2024 was a busy year for MCEF and the One Stop Shop. 1,888 people signed in during the year representing 5,613 persons in the These clients who signed in household. shopped for 2,642 bags of food. Clients also chose 173 bags of selections for Thanksgiving and 109 bags of selections for Holiday food. All of this was made possible from the generous donations of our Mechanicsville Churches. Since we moved to our current location on Stonewall Parkway in 2018, MCEF is grateful for the show of support for the One Stop Shop. Many volunteers have found their way to help on days that fit their schedules. It is a meaningful way to help our friends and neighbors in Mechanicsville. Fairfield, thank you for the continued part you play in this ministry.

In December and January, there were 49 requests for financial assistance and MCEF was able to help with 21.

Current Food Pantry needs are condiments, jelly or jam, individual snacks (like cheese crackers.)






